- "Love does not consist of gazing at each other, but in looking outward together in the same direction." — Antoine de Saint-Exupéry, French writer and aviator.

- "Love is a canvas furnished by nature and embroidered by imagination." — Voltaire, French writer and philosopher.

- "Love is an attempt to change a piece of a dream world into reality." — Theodor Reik, German American psychoanalyst.

Six steps to discovery

1. Connect

How do you feel about this story? -Are you looking forward to Valentine's Day?

2. Wonder

What questions do you have? - For example: How did Valentine's Day get its name?

3. Investigate

What are the facts? - Pick out one thing we know for certain and one thing we cannot say for sure from this story.

4. Construct

What is your point of view? - You are asked to vote for the best definition of love. Think about what you would say.

5. Express

What do others believe? - What is the best song about love? Take it in turns to say.

6. Reflect

What might happen next? - Imagine you get a job with a card company. Make a card for Valentine's, Galentine's or Palentine's Day.

Glossary

Definitions - All of the possible meanings of a word.

Antoine de Saint-Exupéry - A French aviator and writer who wrote The Little Prince.

Aviator - Pilot.

Independently - Doing something without being controlled or helped by someone else

Stendhal - The pen name of Marie-Henri Beyle, a 19th Century French writer.

Voltaire - A French enlightenment writer, historian and philosopher known for his criticism of Christianity and slavery.

James Baldwin - An American writer and civil rights activist who was born in 1924.

civil rights - Rights that protect people's personal freedoms.

Psychoanalyst - A practitioner of psychoanalysis, a set of psychological theories first laid out by Sigmund Freud in the late 19th Century.

Dictionary - A book with a big list of words and their meanings.
