Should everyone be religious? Pope Francis has died. He was known for caring about the poor and living as if he was simply any other man.

## What's happening?

**Pope** Francis died early on Monday morning. The head of the Catholic Church was 88 years old.

The Thursday before he died, he visited prisoners in a jail in **Rome**. He said sorry to the prisoners because he could not wash their feet — but he wanted to be near them.

Pope Francis was unusual in many ways. Born in **Argentina**, he was the first South American leader.

He had worked as a nightclub **bouncer** and liked to dance. He was the first Pope to take the name of Francis. He chose it in honour of a **saint** who had given up all his wealth to work among the poor.

Jorge Mario Bergoglio was born in **Buenos Aires** in 1936. He did not become a priest until the age of 33.

In 1997 he became archbishop of Buenos Aires. He had no wish to become Pope: he once begged a group of **cardinals** not to choose him.

But in 2013, it happened: he was chosen to replace Pope Benedict XVI. He did not choose a grand life. He wore simple white robes and battered shoes. He chose not to live in a palace but a simple house, and he drove a simple car instead of being driven.

He said: "My people are poor, and I am one of them."

Should everyone be religious?

## Glossary

**Pope** - The bishop of Rome and the head of the worldwide Catholic Church.

**Rome** - The city at the centre of the ancient Roman Empire.

**Argentina** - The second-largest country in South America. It has a population of nearly 46 million.

**Bouncer** - A person who works for a nightclub or bar and prevents troublemakers from entering.

Saint - A person who is officially recognised by the Christian, especially Catholic, Church as having lived in a good and holy way. Saints often have miracles attributed to them.

Buenos Aires - The capital city of Argentina.

**Cardinals** - Leading officials in the Roman Catholic Church. They are nominated by the Pope, and choose the next Pope together.
