# Seven indisputable facts about Gaza



Hunger: On Friday, the US president said that "a lot of people were starving" in Gaza. Israel rejects claims of a food shortage.

# What's happening?

Israel's war on Gaza has now been going on for more than one and a half years. A ceasefire between the two sides has ended. Talks are still ongoing on a new deal

Here are seven certain facts:

- 1. Aid blockade. For the last ten weeks Israel has prevented all food, water and shelter materials from entering Gaza.<sup>2</sup> Last night, Israel said it would allow a "basic amount" of food into Gaza.
- 2. Rising prices. In Gaza City, eggs are 1400% more expensive than before the fighting started.3
- 3. Media blackout. Most journalists are forbidden from entering Gaza, but doctors have shared messages showing the damage, including strikes on hospitals.4
- 4. Urban destruction. By January of this year, academics estimated that 59.8% of the buildings in the Gaza Strip had been damaged or destroyed. The UN calculated that the figure was closer to 69%.5

- 5. Hostage situation. The conflict began when Hamas killed at least 1,200 Israelis and took 251 hostages. To this day, 58 hostages remain in Gaza, and Israel believes that 23 are still alive.<sup>6</sup>
- 6. Displaced population. Before the ceasefire, 1.9 million people in Gaza had been displaced — from a population of 2.2 million.<sup>7</sup>
- 7. Disputed death toll. According to the Hamas-run health ministry, at least 51,266 people have been killed in the war. Israel argues that these figures cannot be trusted.8

What is your point of view? - Do you think that schools should be made to teach children about the conflict in Gaza?

#### 5. Express

What do others believe? - Is there anything the leader of your country can do to stop the war? Discuss as a class.

#### 6. Reflec

What might happen next? - Write a letter to world leaders, asking them to work for peace.

#### Glossary

**Israel** - A country in the Middle East, and the only Jewish nation in the modern period. It is seen by Jews, Christians and Muslims as the Holy Land.

Gaza - The smaller of two Palestinian territories, home to two million people. It is located on the Mediterranean coast, bordered by Israel and Egypt.

Ceasefire - An end to fighting — often temporary.

UN - United Nations. An intergovernmental organisation based in New York that aims to maintain international peace and security.

**Hamas** - A militant Palestinian organisation, which has controlled the Gaza Strip since 2007. It is listed as a terrorist organisation in the UK.
