Millions tune in to epic world race



Plucky pair: Fin Gough and Sioned Cray, childhood sweethearts from rural Wales, were just 19 and 20 years old when they started their epic televised race across China, Nepal and India.

In last week's episode the teams raced along the coast of India towards Goa. The brothers Brian and Melvin set off in the lead, but ended up 17 hours behind the leaders

Now in its fifth season, *Race Across the World* has been a huge hit. The teams are not allowed smartphones or credit cards, and can only travel by land or sea.

They are given money equivalent to the airfare to their destination, and can make more by working.

The series' appeal does not lie only in the thrill of the race. How the teams respond to sudden challenges is a major attraction; most show a big growth in confidence and patience.

Tom's eyes were opened to the kindness of strangers: "The majority of people you meet go above and beyond to try and help you any way they can," he says.

What is your point of view? - You are given the choice between a place at university or a round-theworld ticket. Think about what you would say.

5. Express

What do others believe? - Which would be the most exciting place to travel to? Take it in turns to say.

6. Reflect

What might happen next? - Imagine you are racing to a city 100 miles away without money or a smartphone. Write a story about it.

Glossary

Goa - A state in western India, a former Portuguese colony known for its beaches and cultural blend.

Great Wall of China - Actually a number of different walls built over several millennia by different Chinese dynasties. Most of the current wall was built by the Ming dynasty between 1373 and 1644. Contrary to popular belief, the Wall cannot be seen from space.
