# Prince's plea to stop plastic pollution

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Drowning: Every day, roughly 2,000 bin lorries' worth of plastic enters the world's rivers, oceans and lakes.

Can we save our oceans? Prince William wants to help the world's biggest and most important ecosystems before it is too late.

# What's happening?

Oceans are one of the most amazing and mysterious **habitats** on our Earth. They hold incredible life and have fed us for thousands of years.

But now the oceans are changing into huge, empty deserts. Around one-third of their most important **species** could die out.

That is the warning that **Prince William** gave on Sunday for World Oceans Day.

The threat to the oceans comes from many sources. Here are two reasons to worry:

**1. Plastic problems**. Some 11 million tonnes of plastic waste end up in the oceans every year. Animals can get caught in plastic or eat it.

**2. Oxygen out**. As the planet warms up, the sea loses some of its absorbed **oxygen**. Fish depend on oxygenated water: as the oxygen level falls, they begin to die out.

So should we lose hope? Perhaps not. Here are two more reasons to be cheerful:

1. Well-again whales. In the 20th Century, almost 3 million whales were killed by the whaling industry, leaving most species nearly extinct. But then in 1986 a public campaign managed to bring about a worldwide ban on most whaling. Today, whale populations are growing.

**2. Tech tricks**. New technology may also step in to save us. In Japan, scientists have developed a new kind of plastic that fully breaks down in seawater.

Can we save our oceans?

Yes! History shows us that quick action can save key habitats. With a mixture of science and action from politicians, we can save our oceans.

Whaling - The hunting of whales.
